

# Quad-Port STU-C Line Card FRU Installation and Replacement Notes

**Product Number: STUC-4-2B1Q-DIR-2=** 

This document provides an overview of and installation and replacement procedures for the quad-port symmetrical digital subscriber line (SDSL) transmission unit—central office (STU-C) line card. The quad-port STU-C line card (4xSDSL) is a field-replaceable unit (FRU) for the following chassis:

- Cisco 6130 with NI-1
- Cisco 6130 with NI-2
- · Cisco 6160
- Cisco 6260



Only trained and qualified personnel should be allowed to install, replace, or service this equipment.

### Introduction

The 4xSDSL is designed for use in a configuration without a POTS splitter, which provisions one modem directly and is physically connected to one specific subscriber line through the main distribution frame (MDF) connections.

The 4xSDSL

- · Supports four SDSL modem connections.
- · Supports 2B1Q line encoding.
- Transports ATM data at rates of up to 1168 kbps over a single twisted pair of copper wire.
- Converts SDSL modulation from the line into digital data streams to and from the NI-1 and NI-2 card.

The negotiated bit rate is the lower of the following rates:

- The provisioned bit rate set for the 4xSDSL in the management software
- The assigned bit rate at the customer premises equipment (CPE)

Table 1 details the total available SDSL modem connections for each chassis.

For line card intermixing information, refer to the appropriate hardware installation guide for your chassis.

The edge connector key, located on the rear of the 4xSDSL, connects the 4xSDSL to the backplane of the chassis. Two edge connector keys are available for the 4xSDSL: one has six notches (STUC-4-2B1Q-DIR-1=) and one has seven notches (STUC-4-2B1Q-DIR-2=). You can install either version in the Cisco 6130. However, you can only install the edge connector key with seven notches in the Cisco 6160 and Cisco 6260.




The edge connector key with six-notches is no longer available for purchase. However, you may see edge connector keys with six notches in your Cisco 6130 chassis.

# **Faceplate Features**

### **Installation and Replacement Suggestions**

The following examples list recommended installation and replacement practices for the 4xSDSLs.



Any line card that is only partially connected to the backplane can disrupt system operation.

- Do not force the line card into its slot. This action can damage the pins on the backplane if they are not aligned properly with the line card.
- Ensure that the line card is straight and not at an angle when you install the line card in the slot. Installing the line card at an angle can damage the card. Use the guide rails to install the line card correctly.
- Fully depress the ejector levers to ensure that the card connector mates with the backplane correctly. Firmly seat the line card in the slot.

### **Hot Swapping Line Cards**

The 4xSDSL can be hot swapped. Hot swapping allows you to remove, replace, and rearrange the line cards without disconnecting the system power. When the system detects that you have added or removed a 4xSDSL, it automatically runs diagnostic and discovery routines and acknowledges the presence or absence of the line card.

If you remove and replace a

- 4xSDSL with an 4xSDSL, the newly installed line card receives the same provisioning as the original line card. The system resumes operation without any operator intervention.
- 4xflexi (CAP) or 4xflexi (DMT-2) line card with a 4xSDSL, you must delete the original line card in the management software before you remove it from the chassis. If you do not delete the line card before you install the 4xSDSL, an alarm generates in the management software.

After you remove the line card and install the 4xSDSL, the system identifies it as present but unprovisioned.

If an unprovisioned line card is installed for the first time, the system identifies it as present but unprovisioned. Instructions for provisioning the line card are found in the appropriate software guide for your chassis.

### **Preventing Electrostatic Discharge Damage**

Proper ESD protection is required whenever you handle Cisco equipment. ESD damage, which can occur when electronic cards or components are improperly handled, results in complete or intermittent failures. Use an antistatic strap when you handle any card or component.

Follow these guidelines to prevent ESD damage:

- Always use an ESD ankle or wrist strap and ensure that the wrist strap makes good skin contact.
- Connect the equipment end of the strap to the ESD jack on the front of the chassis.
- When you install a component, use available ejector levers or captive installation screws to properly
  seat the bus connectors in the backplane or midplane. These devices prevent accidental removal,
  provide proper grounding for the system, and help ensure that bus connectors are properly seated.
- When you remove a component, use available ejector levers or captive installation screws to release the bus connectors from the backplane or midplane.
- Avoid touching the printed circuit boards or connectors on the NI-2 cards or line cards.
- Place a removed component board-side-up on an antistatic surface or in a static-shielding container. If you plan to return the component to the factory, immediately place it in a static-shielding container.
- Avoid contact between the printed circuit boards and clothing. The wrist strap protects components from ESD voltages on the body only; ESD voltages on clothing can still cause damage.



Periodically check the resistance value of the antistatic strap. Ensure that the measurement is between 1 and 10 megohms.

# Removing and Installing the 4xSDSL

The following sections describe how to remove or install a 4xSDSL.



Proper ESD protection is required whenever you handle Cisco equipment. Installation and maintenance personnel should be properly grounded by means of grounding straps to eliminate the risk of ESD damage to the equipment. Equipment is subject to ESD damage whenever it is removed from the chassis.




All cards must be fully seated in the chassis. Push on the faceplate of each card to be sure that the card is fully seated.

### Removing a 4xSDSL

Complete the following steps to remove a 4xSDSL from the chassis:

- Step 1 Connect a grounding strap to the ESD grounding jack on the chassis.
- Step 2 Use a flat-head screwdriver to move the locking tab from the locked to the unlocked position. Be sure to turn the locking tab so that it does not overlap the line card ejector lever as shown in Figure 2.

Figure 2 Positioning the Locking Tab for the 4xSDSL



- Step 3 Lift the ejector lever to disconnect the line card from the backplane.
- **Step 4** Carefully slide the line card out of the slot.

Either replace the line card that you remove, or insert a blank faceplate in the empty slot. See the "Installing a 4xSDSL" section on page 12 for 4xSDSL installation instructions. See the "Installing a Blank Faceplate" section on page 14 for blank faceplate installation instructions.



Blank faceplates and cover panels serve three important functions: they prevent exposure to hazardous voltages and currents inside the chassis; they contain electromagnetic interference (EMI) that might disrupt other equipment; and they direct the flow of cooling air through the chassis. Do not operate the system unless all cards, faceplates, front covers, and rear covers are in place.


### Installing a 4xSDSL

Complete the following steps to install a 4xSDSL in the chassis:

- Step 1 Connect a grounding strap to the ESD grounding jack on the chassis.
- Step 2 Hold the line card vertically with the faceplate toward you and the connectors facing the chassis slot.
- Step 3 Align the line card edges with the guides at the top and bottom of the slot in the chassis.

Step 4 Lift the ejector lever and gently apply pressure to the faceplate while pushing the line card into the slot.
 Figure 3 shows an example of the line card installation. The installation procedures will be similar for the other chassis.

Figure 3 Installation of the 4xSDSL



- Step 5 Push on the faceplate of the line card to fully seat the card.
- Step 6 Press down on the ejector lever to secure the line card and connect it to the backplane.
- Step 7 Use a flat-head screwdriver to turn the locking tab so that it overlaps the line card ejector lever to prevent inadvertent dislodging. Figure 2 shows how to position the locking tabs.



Note It is not necessary to lock the 4xSDSLs in the Cisco 6130 chassis.

Step 8 Verify that the STATUS LED is solid green after the brief self-test. If the STATUS LED is not green after the self-test, see the appropriate hardware guide for your chassis for troubleshooting procedures.



Note

If you are installing the line card for the first time, refer to the provisioning procedures in the appropriate software guide for your chassis.

### Installing a Blank Faceplate

Complete the following steps to install a blank faceplate in the chassis:



Blank faceplates should occupy any empty line card slots in the chassis. The blank faceplate installation is similar to the line card installation.

- **Step 1** Connect a grounding strap to the ESD grounding jack.
- Step 2 Align the blank faceplate edge with the slot guides in the chassis.
- Step 3 Lift the ejector lever and gently apply pressure to the faceplate while pushing the blank faceplate into the slot.
- **Step 4** Push on the faceplate to fully seat the blank faceplate.
- Step 5 Press down on the ejector lever to secure the faceplate.

# **Traffic Handling**

The 4xSDSL supports up to 1168 kbps upstream and downstream data rates.

*Downstream* refers to data that is coming from the NI-1 card and NI-2 card to the subscriber lines. *Upstream* refers to data that is coming from the subscriber lines to the NI-1 card and NI-2 card.

# System Controller Module Microprocessor



This section applies only to the Cisco 6130 with NI-1 system.

When the system controller module is reset, the module microprocessor executes boot flash. The boot flash code also contains a boot loader for the serial management bus (SMB). If the current image in the 4xSDSL flash is not the latest image available, the system controller module sends the run-time image for the 4xSDSL over the SMB. The image is loaded and run from Flash.
